The Cost of "Working Toward a Better Future"

Here at Kent Youth and Family Services, we are often asked about the cost of our programming. Running four unique programs also means they each have different costs associated with them. In an effort to be as transparent as possible and answer the questions posed by our donors/community members, our program managers provided the following numbers.

Youth and Family Counseling/Substance Abuse Counseling: \$1400-\$1800 per client

Outreach: \$700

Watson Manor Transitional Housing Program: \$13,000 per unit

Head Start and ECEAP: \$11,000 per child per academic year
